Searching South Carolina Land Records - The Council Journals by Sue Dempsey Brewer

In an attempt to take my research back another generation, I became interested in delving a little deeper into some of the earlier South Carolina land records. I had heard several speakers at various meetings talk about information that could be found in the Council Journals at the SC Archives, but never enough information was given so that I felt comfortable in setting out to locate these Journals. In going through some of my material I came across a small booklet by Brent H. Holcomb, dated September 3, 1979 and entitled A Brief Guide to South Carolina Genealogical Research and Records. This booklet explained a little more about the Journals and how they should be used. The following is quoted from Mr. Holcomb's book:

"South Carolina became a Royal Province in 1719, and at this time Royal Land Grants begin. These continue through 1776 and plats are extant for most of these. The proper terminology is Royal Grants and Colonial Plats. For some plats the original or loose copy is extant; these are referred to as Pre-Revolutionary Loose Plats. There are separate indexes for the Royal Grants and Colonial Plats at Archives. When searching these records, spelling variants must be considered. For the period approximately 1749-1773, the Council Journals should be used in connection with plats. On each plat is a precept or warrant date which is within a few days of the date of petition or application for land. Particularly for "poor foreign protestants," this petition gives vital family information and the ship on which the person arrived or port of entry. This does not always work, but a search should be attempted."

Sometime ago I visited the SC Archives and took a look at the Combined Alphabetical Index on microfilm and listed the Dempsey entries. This index includes what type entry is being cited, such as Memorial, Plat, Land Grant, etc. In accordance with the information supplied in Brent Holcomb's book, I decided to take a look at the plats I had listed on my previous visit to the Archives. The index for the Royal Grants and Colonial Plats is on microfilm in the search room and you can pull the film yourself. A plat is a drawing of the land as surveyed and lists the names of the adjoining property owners. Underneath each plat is a paragraph giving the precept date and the names of the adjoining property owners. I wrote down the precept date for each Dempsey entry. Then I pulled the microfilm, located in the search room filing cabinets, containing the Council Journals for the dates I wanted to locate. Well, I must tell you that the Council Journals were fascinating. It takes a few minutes the first time you look at them to realize what the Journals are all about. They contain a lot of interesting stories about the matters brought before the Council pertaining to what was going on in the State. Brent Holcomb had said in his book that on each plat is a precept date which is within a few days of the date of the petition or application for land. I found that if you look back in the Council Journals a few days prior to the precept date taken from the Plats, in a lot of cases you will find that a ship had just arrived from England, Ireland, Germany, etc., and it will tell when it arrived, at what port it arrived, who the captain was and will usually state that the people on board came in promise of the bounty offered. The bounty being offered to get people to come to America was land. The Journal then lists the people on board and their ages. Many times you can tell if a family is being listed by the ages given. Later in the Journal, in many instances, the land will be granted.

There are a lot of interesting stories about dealings with the Indians and ships requesting to come into port for various reasons. There was a lengthy complaint about a man being tied to a tree and beaten by a mob of people for no apparent reason, listing names, places and dates.

Well, I got so caught up in reading the Journals that I did not have time to finish looking up all my references, but I had a wonderful time and yes, I'm going back!

THE BURRISS FAMILY By Ed Hillhouse.

One of the oldest and largest families in Anderson County is that of Burriss, spelled in several different ways, but all of the same blood. Joshua Burriss was among the early settlers of this area which was still in the Pendleton District at that time. The treaty between General Andrew Pickens and the Indians at Hopewell had just opened this area up for settlers.

Joshua Burriss emanated from Virginia and North Carolina ancestors, and these from English stock of numerous names. His wife was Sarah Chamblee. It was soon after 1776 that he moved to South Carolina and set up residence not far from where Wellington or Gluck mill is now located. He and Sarah were blessed with seven children, all of whom settled on land up and down Generostee Creek that was given to them by their father.

Joshua and Sarah Burriss may have been charter members of Mountain Creek Baptist Church which was organized in 1789. He became a man of wealth and at one time owned as much land as constitutes a township. His possessions embraced parts of what is now Centerville, Rock Mills, Savannah, and Varennes Townships.

In settling his sons, Joshua used a method all his own. He placed them up and down Generostee Creek according to their ages. Elisha, the oldest, was placed where the Anderson Country Club is today. The next oldest was James, whose home stood near where the Orr Mill is now. John's land was about where the Watson home is today. Thomas' land was near Rock Mills. His daughters were differently placed. One of them, Mary, who married Lewis Chamblee, owned the area around Rose Hill. Her son, Moses, sold part of it to Judge Whitner.

James Burriss, the second son of Joshua and Sarah Burriss, was a minister and was pastor of several churches in the Anderson area. He organized a church, Mount Tabor, which stood where the Saluda Baptist Association office is today. After the city of Anderson was established, this church was moved into the city and is today the First Baptist Church of Anderson.

Later in life, Joshua and Sarah Burriss moved to Mount Tabor to be near their son James. Joshua died there in 1804 and was buried in the cemetery there beside his wife, Sarah. This cemetery was moved to the First Baptist Church Cemetery when the Saluda Association Office was built. Their graves are not marked in any way.

WRITING AN EFFECTIVE QUERY

Most publications ask that queries be 30 words or less. Can you be effective with so few words? Long, involved queries do not interest most researchers. They like concise, to-the-point statements, regarding specific persons. The trick is to make the words do double duty. PARENTAGE — stands for father and mother. ANCESTRY — means all generations as far back as possible.

Word your query so that it will stimulate interest. The researcher can see a familiar name, date, and place at a glance. An example that might catch someone's eye:

"Seek ancestry of John Sample. Lived in Edgefield, SC during Revolutionary War. Went to Marengo Co, Alabama, 1820, buried Jefferson, AL."

Here are 22 words; your name and address would follow.

Be careful how you use pronouns. Be sure that "he" or "she" refers to the last person mentioned. Many people offer to exchange information on a certain surname. You can end up with a box full of paper on John Smith in Vermont and your John Smith came from Virginia. It is something like a pile of used clothes at a rummage sale.

If you have several families that you are seeking information on, submit several queries. Catch your reader's attention with a short, to-the-point query - results will soon come in the mail.

TRACING A WAR LETTER

S. C. Soldiers Home Richmond Va: May 24th 1864

Dear Father: I arrived here this morning - from Bedford County - five miles from Liberty where I have been staying for two weeks. I was in hospital at Liberty - and a very rich old fellow brought his carriage into town and carried me to his house - where I found every comfort necessary for a convalescent. He gave me a roon and a servant - plenty of good books - and told me to make myself at home. Had plenty of fine horses and told me to ride when I liked, and the rich milk and butter vegetables and every thing good were enough to haunt me to the "Fancy Farm". I must give you his name for there are few such men in this world and such families as this are not to be found. Robert N. Kelso - his wife and daughter (Miss Sue P. Kelso) one son in the 2nd VA Cavalry and one married son at home compose the family. The son who belongs to the Army was dangerously wounded the day Gen Stuart was mortally wounded. His thigh was fractured - So his father, Mother, Sister and brother came to see him and are here now - they left me though at their home and told me to stay as long as I liked - I staid one week after they left - and am here enroute for my command. I must call and see them this evening - as I have learned where they are. I have a special invitation to go back there and stay if I ever get sick or wounded. I hear James is wounded and gone home - I know no news now - i must get to my command in time for the next great battle - as I have missed so much - though I am not well - by a great deal - I go to the front trusting in the God of battles for protection and victory. Remember my friends in Bedford - they are good Presbyterians - and true to our cause. Forgive me Father. I can't write. Remember me in all your prayers.

(SA 29 May 1926 ADM P. 3) VALIANT SOLDIER CLAIMED BY DEATH Capt. Peter A. McDavid Passed Away After Several Months Illness

Greenville, May 29 - Captain Peter A. McDavid, valiant soldier of the Confederacy and one of Greenville's most valued citizens, passed away at his home 109 Toy Street,

early yesterday. Death came quietly after several months of illness. He was 85 years of age. The body will be laid to rest this morning in Sprinkwood cemetery after simple funeral rites have been held at the Buncombe Street Methodist church. Rev. C. E. Peele, his pastor, will conduct the service. Members of Camp Pullman, U. C. V. in which organization he was a leading figure, will attend the services in a body to pay last respects to their comrade.

Called to Arms.

Captain McDavid was born at Ingleside in Greenville county June 13, 1841. While attending the Anderson Military academy conducted at that time by Messrs. Adams and McQueen, the call to arms in defense of the Confederacy was sounded. With other students in the academy Captain McDavid left his studies and rallied 'round the Stars and Bars. He joined the unit known as the Palmetto riflemen. Fleetwood Clinkscales, of Anderson, is now the only survivor of that organization, it is said. After long service with that organization he was transferred to Company L. Second South Carolina rifles, remaining with that unit throughout the remainder of the war. He had entered service as a private, but was promoted to captaincy. Had the conflict continued for a short time he would have retired as a major, as he had been recommended for this appointment.

Act of Valor.

At one time during his service he was made color bearer for his regiment and of the various positions which he held, this post appealed to him most. He became regimental color bearer at the second battle of Manassas when Thad Dean, his predecessor, was killed at Fraser's Farm. At Manassas, Captain McDavid distinguished himself by gathering together the scattered and depleted forces of his company and with daring courage led the column again into battle, marching at the head with the colors. This action was declared by some who saw it to be one of the outstanding heroic acts of the entire conflict. When General Lee surrendered at Appomatox, Captain McDavid returned to his Ingleside home and for a number of years engaged in farming. Later he came to Greenville and operated a mercantile business. He was one of the organizers and among the first to command Camp Pullman. He was commissioner of pensions for Greenville county, until his increasing feebleness made it necessary that he be relieved. He was a member of the Masonic fraternity and of the Buncombe Street Methodist Church.

Survived by Children.

His wife, who was before marriage Miss Francis Sullivan, daughter of the late Dr. J. M. Sullivan, passed away January of last year. Besides a host of friends over this entire state, Captain McDavid is survived by two daughters, Mrs. Harriet Hicklin, of Norfolk, Va., and Miss Theresa McDavid, of Greenville, and a son, J. A. McDavid, also of this city. The following will act as pall bearers at the funeral services today: D. E. McCuen, B. L. McCaskill, George W. Ebaugh, B. F. Rush, Dr. E. W. Carpenter, Maj. W. F. Robertson, Harry A. Dargan, W. H. Ambler, W. H. Austin, Lindsay Wilson and Col. E. M. Blythe.
