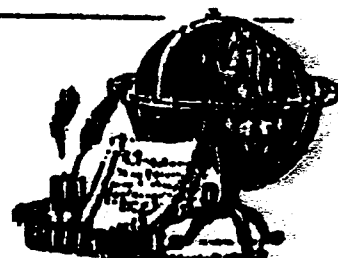

Margaret Snider Coker, 69, of 700 Woodlake Road died Friday, March 3, 2000, at Anderson Area Medical Center.

Born in Easley, she was the first female graduate of Clemson University, graduating with honors with a bachelor of science degree in chemistry. She was a retired glass lab supervisor at Owens Corning with 29 years of service. She was a member of the Owens Corning Retired Ladies Club, where she served as secretary; the Anderson Genealogical Society, where she served as book chairman; and New Prospect Baptist Church.

Surviving are her mother, Annie Moore Snider of Anderson; son, Buddy Coker of Anderson; daughter, Dianne C. Brown of Anderson; brother, Leroy Snider of Anderson; sister, Barbara Smith of Anderson; and two grandchildren.

She was the widow of Donald Ray Coker and the daughter of the late Julian Snider.

Services are at 11 a.m. Monday at New Prospect Baptist Church by Dr. L.E. Greene and the Rev. Ken Thrift; burial will follow in the church cemetery. The body is at Sullivan-King Mortuary and will be placed in the church at 10:30 a.m. Monday.

The family is at the home of her brother, Leroy Snider, 2001 Lynn Ave., Anderson.

Some new and exciting things are taking place as you can see in the Minutes of our March meeting:

(Please note that Gist Brown will be making name badges free of charge for members as they pay their membership dues for this year. These badges will be available at the door during each meeting to be worn during the meeting and then left with Jenny Gentry who will have them available at each meeting for us to wear.)

The Anderson County Chapter of the South Carolina Genealogical Society met Monday, March 6, 2000, at the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints on Harden Road in Anderson. There were 24 present, including the speaker.

Juanita Garrison, president, called the meeting to order.

Lamar Gamble gave the invocation.

There was a moment of silence for longtime member Margaret Coker, who was killed in an automobile accident March 3. It was announced that a book would be donated to the library as a memorial and a card would be sent to her family.

Several members wore new name badges that were done by Gist Brown. The president explained that Gist would fill orders from members as they paid.

Ron Kay, treasurer, announced that sixty-two members had paid dues before the meeting; at the end of the meeting three more paid dues, for a total of sixty-five. There was a balance of \$10,603.55 in the treasury. The new lectern, which was used for the first time at this meeting, cost \$96.60; it was purchased at Martin's Office Supplies, Inc. Twenty-two pins of the State organization were sold to chapter members.

Ron Kay also reported that the Anderson website was updated the first of March.

Carl Ellison announced that he was working on the earliest Anderson County marriage records and has completed about half of Book 1. The next announcement was that he has received permission to copy records of Sullivan King Mortuary from 1923; he has completed the first book and has started the second one. Also, he announced that he would be teaching an Adult Education course in computer research for beginners (or not too advanced) at Westside High School for six weeks, 6:30-8:30 Tuesday nights, using Family Tree Maker 7.0; those interested should contact Mrs. Seawright.

Gist Brown reported that the April program would be Dr. Don Kay from Charleston, who did the Kay book.

David Beville introduced the speaker, Dennis Taylor, archivist in Special Collections in the Strom Thurmond Institute, Clemson University Libraries. He explained that there are two groups of genealogical materials in Special Collections: State and Local History and Deed Abstracts; the census collection is located at the main library. Then he did a delightful slide presentation of pictures used in a book he had compiled, Rural Life in the Piedmont.

After the presentation, the meeting was adjourned.

### ERVIN (IRVINE) BIBLE RECORDS

Bible belonged to Colonel John Ervin (1745 - 1810). It passed to lineal descendant, Erasmus Powe Ervin, born at Indiantown, S. C. Oct. 30, 1878. Description of Bible: Printed by Alex-Kinkaid his Majesty's Printer Edinbergh. MDCCLXXVI. "Allowed by authority of the General Assembly of the King of Scotland, and appointed to be read in the churches." There are a number of interesting tables, one being, "Table of Kindred and Affinity wherein whosoever are related are forbidden in Scriptures and by our laws to marry." (On some extra blank pages has been written a short sketch of the Irvin Family).

Deeming it a privilege and a duty, I hereby set down what I know of our family history and divers facts adjudged important for posterity to cherish, The Errvins, Erwyns, Irvines, Ervins, trace to antiquity. For this sketch it will suffice to begin with ORYNIN IRWIN, ATHBANE OF DULE, who held highest title then conferred in Scotland and was the founder of the line of Kings of the name Irvine. He married with the daughter of King Malcolm and so they became the ancestors of the Scottish kings. Later when the Bruce fled his enemies, sanctuary was found with the Irwyns and William Irwyn became his companion. The resting place was a holly-grove and so the Holly forms part of the family's Armorial Bearings. In gratitude for his loyalty Sir William Irwyn was granted a Barrony which for a thousand years has been possessed by Irwyns. To shorten these annals we continue with John Irvine, Esq., who married with the daughter of his kinsman James Irvine of Fortrie. Their son John married as first wife his kinswoman Jeanne Irvine, and their son James Irvine, Esq. was my grandfather. He married with Elizabeth daughter to Captain John William James and his wife Ann Wyndham. It is found that he came of a long line of William James, and so to distinguish them, each also was known by a double name. The Irvines, being Protestants, left the old Nation during the period of religious upheaval and settled in North Ireland.

Howsoever soon conditions became intolerable and being of courageous and pioneering spirit they decided to seek a better land in America on the southern frontier. My grandfather was a man of huge stature with piercing dark eyes, fearless, of commanding presence, with various abilities. Thru his veins coursed the blood of centuries of warriors and of his Scottish sires, who patrolled the borders of their land repelling many invaders. It was destined that he would be a leader in rounding up the First band of colonists for the proposed settlement on Black River in the State of South Carolina. His family were amongst those who in 1732 blazed the trail for other footsteps to follow. This colony of some dozen families, under command of Roger Gordon sailed from Belfast and endured the hazardous passage of over two months across the Ocean, beset by tempest, perils and untold suffering and sickness. One Irvine son perished and was consigned to the bosom of the deep. My grandfather's family was large, being Rebecca, Elizabeth, Robert, Marjory, William, Samuel, Annabella (Ann) Jeanne, Gilbert, John, Bruce, Agnes, Alexander, Hugh, (do not know the order), with a daughter-in-law and

some grandchildren. Great was their sorrow when most of these passed in the tragedy of the great mortality. On the voyage across the family was sorely ill and on safe arrival in Charles Towne it was necessary to tarry until health was restored. Subsequently the sons of Robert and John, last named bring only a lad, with a sister, being of hardihood and daring hearts, were in the vanguard that opened up the trail from Charles Towne to the Kingstree. Also of this company were our kinsmen, the James and Wilson families. Some two years later came our kinsmen the Witherspoons and others.

The lad, JOHN ERVIN, was my father, and he later married with Elizabeth, daughter to Robert Ellison, Esq. In South Carolina our name soon came to be spelled ERVIN. Oft I have heard my father tell of this pioneering enterprise, of how their small vessel crept cautiously up the dark tortuous reaches of the Black River, bordered with thickly forested swamps that shut out the daylight. Their apprehensions for safety increased when oft the silence was shattered by hideous and unearthly screams of wild things. On reaching the Kings Tree great was their surprise to find nothing but primeval wilderness. Notwithstanding the company scattered to select home sites near streams or springs. The Irvines chose a bluff about a mile distant and set to work to fell the mighty trees and clear away undergrowth. A crude shelter was erected tight on the sides of the prevailing winds. Later when joined by the balance of the family a large cabin was built with thached roof and mud chimneys. My father was one of a few forthright patriots of our District at commencement of struggle for Independence. His business oft carried him to George Towne and to Charles Town so he remayned better posted and saw the future more clearly than most of his neighbors. Frem the first he cast his lot with America and influenced many others in those early days.

He was most wrathful over the Stamp Act and advised everone to refuse to buy tea that had been shipped to Charles Towne. He assumed the office of Commisary, gathered equipment and medicine for our great cause. Grandmother Elizabeth, that grand Matriarch and venerable war Heroine, used her great skill as a nurse in those times before our section god organized. She suffered blindness in later life. Mother and my wife JANE also did their part nobly by securing information for my Regiment and for General Marion. We were a house united in one great purpose, a fight to the finish for Liberty and America.

Our kinsmen the JAMES family from their arrival in 1732 on thru the dark days of the great struggle, gave without stint of their time and talent to the welfare of our District. It was WILLIAM JAMES, brother to my grandmother, who named WILLIAMSBURG, and it was his son the daring MAJOR JOHN JAMES of many brave exploits who organized the men of our District and could have led them in battle, but instead recommended his friend, FRANCIS MARION. This was the beginning of Marions brigade of which my regiment was a part. Our kinsmen the Ellisons and Witherspoons were conspicuous in their life and death fight for freedom; however, the last named were more prone to the church.

Now my children, I adjure you, hold fast to your hearts always, your grand and gloriuos heritage. Your forebears have laid down requisite precepts for you to follow. May they be a stimulus to laudable ambition, so that you will make worthy contributions to your country, be a faithful servant to your church and add renown and

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splendor to the History of the Irvine Family. My blessings rest upon you. May Jehovah be with you and prosper you.

Births, marriages and death records follow, in the the usual record pages.

### ERVIN

The Ervins of Williamsburg County, S. C., were Scotch-Irish. They trace their ancestry to John Irvine and his wife, who was a daughter of a kinsman, John Irvine, of Fortrie, Scotland. Their son, John Irvine, and his first wife, Jeanne Irvine, were the parents of James Irvine, who may rightly be described as the founder of the family in America. James Ervin was born probably in County Down in North Ireland. Here he married Elizabeth James, and maintained his residence until his migration to America. The parents of Elizabeth James were John William James and his wife, Anne Wyndham, who was the daughter of Sir Thomas Wyndham. John William James was a Welshman, who served as a captain of dragoons under William of Orange in the Irish Wars and established his home at Dromore in County Down. James and Elizabeth Ervin sailed from Belfast, Ireland, in 1732, and landed in Charleston with Roger Gordon. He settled in Williamsburg and may have had brothers in Pennsylvania. James Ervin and his family settled on Broad or Kingstree Swamp, a mile north of the present town of Kingstree. James Ervin was a planter and a staunch Presbyterian. He is said to have been a ruling elder in the Presbyterian Church. The names of their children were found in the Bible of Col. John Ervin.

1. Rebecca Ervin reached maturity and served as an administratrix of her father's estate.
2. Elizabeth Ervin married a Shaw, and died in Dec., 1761, survived by a son, John Shaw.
3. Robert Ervin died testate in St. John's Parish, Berkeley County, prior to April 16, 1774, survived by his wife, Susannah Ervin, and a son, Samuel Ervin.
4. Marjory Ervin
5. William Ervin
6. Samuel Ervin enlisted in a company which was organized in Williamsburg in 1759 for service in the French and Indian War.
7. Annabella (Anne) Ervin
8. Jeanne Ervin
9. Gilbert Ervin
10. John Ervin resided in Williamsburg and married Elizabeth Ellison and died March 18, 1773, survived by his son, Col. John Ervin, of Marion's Brigade, and other issue.
11. Bruce Ervin
12. Agnes Ervin
13. Alexander Ervin
14. Hugh Ervin resided in Williamsburg and married 1st Mary Ellison, and 2nd Elizabeth James. He enlisted in a company in the French and Indian War and died Sept. 25, 1785, leaving issue.

James Ervin "passed on Sabbath morn at 3 o'clock on 31st July 1776 ripe in years." Elizabeth James Ervin "departed this life Satdy evening at 11 o'clock on 1st Decbr 1782 in the midst of her family."

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John Ervin, son of James and Elizabeth James Ervin, married Elizabeth Ellison, daughter of Robert Ellison. Their children:

1. Elizabeth Ervin (b. March 14, 1748) married John Fulton.
2. Sarah Ervin (b. Dec. 10, 1750) married John Dobbin and died Feb. 28, 1772, survived by a daughter, Sarah Dobbin (b. Feb. 23, 1772).
3. James Ervin of the Revolution
4. John Ervin (b. March 25, 1754) served as Col. during the Revolution. He married Mrs. Hannah Blackwell of Georgetown on Dec. 10, 1801
5. Jean Ervin (b. March 16, 1756)
6. Mary Ervin (b. Sept. 21, 1758) married Capt. John James
7. Robert Ervin (b. April 27, 1761) married 1st Jane Ervin, and 2nd, Elizabeth James.
8. Hugh Ervin
9. Margaret Ervin (b. June 10, 1765)

## STORIES FROM THE WAR

### Interviews With Anderson County's Confederate Veterans

On May 27-28, 1914 the annual reunion of the S. C. Division of the United Confederate Veterans was held in the city of Anderson. To commemorate the event the *Anderson Intelligencer* published an edition described as a "Special Reunion Number Complimentary to the United Confederate Veterans." This edition, published May 26, 1914, contained interviews with 102 Confederate veterans then living in Anderson county. Some stories were only a few lines while others ran to several paragraphs and contained names of other veterans. The list of veterans and the units in which they indicated they served appears on the next page. Anyone with an ancestor listed should go to the main Anderson county library and read the veteran's account of his service. The papers are on microfilm.

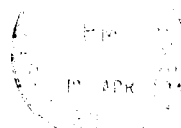
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
