I didn't mean for this to be a commercial for the site but Ancestry makes its website available as a depository for your tree so it can serve as a backup for all your research. There are some items that are free. For example my family tree is open to all those that might be researching the same persons. The databases like Census' available through Ancestry still must be purchased.

Genealogy gives such a satisfaction- the hunt, the capture of the information and the sharing of the data. I wish for all our members to have the very best experiences in 2010 and may your brick walls come down.

However, the library would need to understand that their published copy will need to be taken apart, so that single loose-leaf pages will result.

NEWSPAPERS ONLINE

The University of South Carolina has received a grant of \$350,000 from the National Endowment for the Humanities for a project that will scan 100,000 pages of old newspapers into an online database. The newspapers will be from all over the state published between 1860 and 1922. Digital librarian Kate **Boyd** will be in charge and the newspapers will be made available through the Library of Congress' database

First Licensed Physician was from the Upstate

(Abstracted from several newspaper articles by Jim **Wigington** and an article written by Bill **Tripp** in William Gilmore **Simms**' <u>History of South Carolina</u>, c. 1922, sent in by Jannifer **Burriss**)

William Austin **Tripp** was born and reared in the Brushy Creek township of Anderson County (currently Powdersville area) 21 Sep 1866, a son of John Robert and Harriet "Hettie" Elizabeth **Johnson** Tripp. John Robert Tripp was the oldest son of Elias and Sarah Ann **Smith** Tripp and grandson of John Tripp who had settled on Reedy River in Greenville County. The Elias Tripp family first settled in Pickens County but later they removed to Greenville. John Robert enlisted in the Confederate Army to serve four years. After the war, in May 1865, he married and rented his wife's family farm in Anderson County. He and Hettie had two children, William Austin and Essie Cornelia who married Hubbert B. Smith. Hettie died when the children were small and John Robert married secondly Mattie **Reeve.** Ten years later, he bought land in Anderson County and became a farmer until his death in 3 June 1910.

Will Tripp grew up on the family farm in the Mt. Springs area near where Wren High School stands today. He attended school at Mt. Springs and Cedar Wreath. He met his future wife attending Mt. Springs Church and in 1882 walked to Amanda Elizabeth Bryant's house, asked her to marry him and they walked to Piedmont to be married. They lived in a one-room house and soon had three children. One day, he decided that farming was not for him and he thought about becoming a doctor. In fall of 1889, he entered Atlanta Medical College, excelled and graduated at the top of his class in 1894. Graduation, however, did not guarantee him a job in South Carolina. He had to take a test before the S. C. Medical Examination Board. This was the first year that the testing program was required for a license.

The test, given in Charleston, was long and difficult but Will finished first. After the test was over, the proctor told Will to go home and they would notify him by mail. He told the director that he would not go until he knew if he had passed or failed. The board was convinced to grade his paper that day. Because it was the first paper graded, William Austin Tripp became the first licensed physician to practice medicine in the state of South Carolina.

Dr. Will Tripp knew the need was great for professional doctors in the upstate and decided to come back to where he was raised to open a practice. In 1895, he opened an office in the Three and Twenty community of Anderson County. His principal means of transportation was horseback. He had to provide himself with equipment, and even drugs to serve his patients. By 1892, his practice had grown so that he had to buy a two-wheel road cart to travel around the countryside. He was in such demand by everyone, even farmers would call on him to help with their animals since there were no veterinarians. Fights and accidents kept him busy as well as mothers giving birth. Typhoid fever, croup, pneumonia were usually treated with home remedies. It was standard practice before the twentieth century to use the "Four P's" — puke, purge, plaster and phlebotomy (bleeding). Sometimes the cure could be worse than the disease. Of course, as medical knowledge increased, the old-time cures were no longer

used, like treating croup with sulphur and molasses, or using a piece of red flannel greased with tallow and kerosene as a plaster on the chest for colds and pneumonia.

Dr. Will developed an extensive library and continued to learn about his profession. He had a cure for pellagra, a disease caused by a deficiency of niacin in the diet. He was one of the first doctors to treat diabetic patients with insulin. It wasn't long before he soon needed a bigger office and he bought 44 acres of land across the road owned by James **Burdine**, for \$58 per acre, the highest price paid for land in the area to build an office. He and Amanda had nine children together. The eight boys and one girl became great helpers around the farm and grew up to be valued members of the community.


Dr. Will was a member of the Anderson and Pickens Counties Medical societies and the State Medical Society. In 1913, he was elected by S.C. legislature to be a trustee of the S.C. Medical College. He was appointed by Governor **Blease** to be Anderson County Treasurer to fill out an unexpired term, serving in that office one year. He was considered a candidate for the Superintendent of the State Hospital but Dr. Tripp wouldn't accept the office because it meant moving to Columbia. During World War I, Dr. Tripp served on the Exemption Board. His workdays were quite long after putting in long hours working for the Board, he came home to patients at night, who had been waiting all day. It was also during the time of the great Influenza epidemic.

Dr. Tripp was involved in Community affairs such as Woodman of the World. He was a Master Mason and Knight of Pythias. He had a vital interest in local schools and was one of three men who served on a commission to build the first major roads in Anderson County. He remained active politically and often treated Anderson County officers and employees at his home to a "possum and tater supper." This bill of fare was quite a delicacy during the time.

The center portion of the Palmetto Riflemen photo reads as follows:

Commissioned Officers of the Palmetto Riflemen 1861-1865

- 1. JAMES H. WHITNER, Captain, promoted to Major, 4th S.C. V. Died 1886.
- 2. WM. W. HUMPHRIES, Captain, promoted to Major P.S.S. Died 1893.
- 3. THOS. PRUE BENSON, Captain, Died 1880.
- 4. CLAUDIUS E. EARLE, Lieutenant. Died 1861.
- 5. AMAZIA FELTON, Lieutenant. Killed in battle 1862.
- 6. MINIT McGEE, Lieutenant. Transferred to Cavalry. Living 1903.
- 7. JOEL H. GLEASON, Lieutenant. Killed in battle 1862.
- 8. JAMES A HOYT, Lieutenant. Living 1903.
- 9. NF TON A. McCULLY, Lieutenant. Died 1893.
- 10. V ... POE, Lieutenant. Killed in battle.

The Palmetto Riflemen consisted from first to last of 145 men.

Of this number 10 were discharged through disability from wounds or sickness.

30 were transferred to other commands. 34 were killed in battle. 14 died of disease while in service.

And of the remainder 34 were wounded more or less severely. 39 surrendered at Appomattox.

55 are still living in 1903.
