Wants Names Old Roads in Piedmont Preserved by Oze E. Horton, Atlanta

Why not stop the destruction of old landmarks, rich in history, traditions and legends, preservation of which would make many places and sections mellow and attractive?

The people of Greenville have has the good sense to preserve the name of Buncombe road leading from Greenville north to Asheville, North Carolina, and down the French Broad river into Tennessee, where thousands of droves of horses, mules, cattle, hogs and sheep have been driven going south during the days before the War Between the States. The road leading south out of Greenville to Augusta, Georgia is another old highway rich in history and mellow traditions, whose name has been wisely preserved.

In the early days of upper south Carolina the highway from Belton north up the ridge. west of the Saluda River, to old Pickensville (located near Easley) was known as the Five Notch road, a name rich and colorful in historic value, but which name seems to have lona since disappeared. Pickensville was the county seat of old Washington District, embracing what is now Greenville, Anderson, Pickens and Oconee counties, but this district seems to have been subdivided along about 1789 and the districts of Greenville and Pendleton were established. The first named district was named for the late Nathaniel Green of Revolutionary fame and the latter district was named for Judge Henry Pendleton of Virginia. Pendleton District was subdivided into Anderson and Pickens Districts in 1828 and Oconee was cut off of Pickens after the War Between the States.

Old Pickensville was the birthplace and home of the late Gen. Waddy Thompson until he was grown, who was a brilliant orator, member of Congress and Minister Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary to Mexico

The road, in early days, from Pelzer running west through what is now Williamston, crossing the old Five Notch road two miles west of Williamston, to Anderson (C.H.) was known as the Wilson's Ferry road. That good old name has long since been dropped. Why lose the rich. mellow history and traditions of this name? On this Wilson's Ferry road lived in ante bellum days many prominent families. among whom were the Hammonds. Augustus Vandiver and many others prominent in the history of the section. This Wilson's Ferry road took its name from a distinguished man who lived and owned a plantation where the buzzing city of Pelzer is now located, and owned and operated a ferry on the Saluda river known as Wilson's Ferry. This Mr. Wilson was a member to Congress from his district in the early days of northwestern South Carolina and I understand is buried on his plantation. I hope the D.A.R.'s marked Mr. Wilson's grave as he must have been either a Revolutionary soldier or a friend to the cause of liberty. At any rate he was a prominent man.

The road leading from Anderson, South Carolina, west to old Shallow Ford, just below the location of Earle's bridge, on Seneca river was known for many years as the Shallow Ford road, but, as I understand, the good old primitive name has long since been dropped. This road, after passing over the Shallow Ford on Seneca river, led northwest, one prong going to Knox's bridge on the Tugalo river and the other to Townville.

The south end of the old Five Notch road extended on south of Belton through what is now Honea Path and on down the line of the present Columbia and Greenville railroad, a road used by the people in the Belton and Williamston sections in going to Hamburg and Augusta in the old days.

In the neighborhood of what is now Hodges was a country hamlet known as Dead Fall. This country hamlet's identity and location has almost entirely disappeared. Some years ago I made an investigation, personally, to locate the Dead Fall, and became satisfied that it was situated near what is now Hodges; while I was in Abbeville county I also made inquiry for the ancient site of an old Baptist church located somewhere in that county by the name of Penial. which has but long disappeared. Though I made diligent inquiry for the location of this old church I failed to find any information that would locate the site of this ancient place. I have heard my father say that the late Rev. Moses Holland (affectionately called Daddy Holland) attended a session of the Saluda association at old Penial church during August, 1828, in Abbeville District, was stricken with fever on this trip, returned home and died. This must have been along about 1828. This good man did a great work for the Christian religion and the civilization of upper South Carolina, and was also a Revolutionary soldier.

There was another road leading out of Belton going southwest via Craytonville and on down into the Antreville section called the Trail road. This name seems to have long since disappeared. This road evidently followed along the line of an old Indian trail or path.

The road from Anderson via Neal's Creek and Craytonville to Abbeville was known as the Abbeville road. A prong of this old Abbeville road turned off at Neal's Creek church, northwest, going out by what is now Eureka, old Midway Presbyterian church and on to Pendleton, and was called the Pendleton road. i have heard my mother, who was reared near Neal's Creek church, say that the coming and going of old-fashioned stage coaches brought quite a thrill to her childish heart when she would hear the blast of the bugle and the grinding of gravel under the wheels of the stage something like railroad coach. It was trains in later years.

The old General's road, leading out of Anderson south through Verannis,(sic) seems to have lost its ancient name, also. This road was named the General's road because the General Muster met at a muster ground on this highway near Verannis.

I do hope that this suggestion will strike a responsive cord with the D.A.R.'s and that they may mark these highways and, if possible, restore the ancient names. If it were not for the good work which they have done in preserving the history of our country much valuable information would have been lost and lost forever.
